Introduction

This Service promotes hand washing as a preventative measure in minimising the spread of infection and supporting a healthy environment.

Goals

- To help minimise the spread of infection by encouraging hand washing.
- To ensure staff and visitors are informed of best practice in relation to hand washing procedures

Practices

- Our Service provides the appropriate basins and liquid soap for children/educators to wash their hands and paper towels for hand drying
- Educators and children are encouraged to wash their hands:
 - Upon arrival to reduce the introduction of germs.
 - Before and after handling food, including a baby's bottle.
 - Before eating
 - After doing any dirty tasks such as cleaning, handling garbage
 - After handling pets
 - After playing outside.
 - Before and after changing nappies.
 - After removing gloves.
 - After going to the toilet.
 - After cleaning up blood, faeces or vomit.
 - After wiping a nose
 - Before and after giving first aid.
 - Before and after giving a child medication and if giving medication to more than one child between each child.
 - Before going home to prevent taking germs home.
- Hand sanitizer dispensers are placed strategically throughout the Service for educators to access when
 there is not time to access the basins and soap, however proper hand washing should be followed up as
 soon as possible.

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- Instructions on how to effectively wash hands are displayed throughout the Service. It is encouraged that all children, families, educators and visitors to the Service practice the following procedure for washing hands:
 - 1. Wash hands using running water and soap.
 - 2. Rub hands vigorously while counting slowly from 1 to 10.
 - 3. Wash hands all over ensuring that the back of the hands, wrists, between fingers and under the fingernails are cleaned.
 - 4. Rinse hands thoroughly while counting slowly from 1 to 10.
 - 5. Turn off the tap using a clean piece of paper towel.
 - 6. Dry hands thoroughly with clean paper towel.

This should take about as long as singing "Happy Birthday" twice.
